

One of the first questions that most people ask me when I tell them that I work at Teller Wildlife Refuge is, "What goes on at Teller?" My

response is always, "A lot!" Especially for an organization that owns and cares for 1,200 acres, and has only four employees. This spring, "a lot" is a lot more than usual.

Thanks to the incredible generosity of our many friends at last year's TnT, we are repainting all four of Teller's historic farm houses. Most of the painting funds were raised during the "Fund the Need" portion of TnT,

where Teller requests support for a significant need we have identified within the organization. It feels good to know that these wonderful, historic structures will be preserved for future generations to enjoy.

At the same time, we are also building a new structure next to the Slack Barn – an indoor bathroom facility! We installed a new septic

28TH HAMILTON **CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT RESULTS**

December 20, 2014 - What a great day! A record setting day, a fine day to spend looking for birds, counting birds, and enjoying the company of congenial folks. The weather cooperated and so did the birds. We saw 77 species - only one less than the all-time record from 2013. We had one new species, a grebe sp. (either a Western or Clark's) on the Daly Mansion Pond.

There were 30 field observers and 23 feeder watchers. We covered about 216 miles driving and 11 walking; there were 8 parties in the field.

We saw new record highs for 8 species: Gadwall, Bufflehead, Red-tailed Hawk, Magpie, White-breasted Nuthatch, Redwinged Blackbird, Red Crossbills and tied the "record" of 1 for Great-gray Owl. The number of Red-tailed Hawks, 95, exceeded the number of Rough-legged Hawks for only the fourth time. It was a great day for raptors, as we saw every one of the species that normally winter here including Prairie Falcons, Merlin, and Kestrel, and all the Accipiters for only the sixth time. We saw

10,484 birds, 53% of them waterfowl. We've seen 31 species every year and 21 species only once. With the addition of the Grebe sp., we have seen a total of 129 species in the Hamilton CBC Circle.

All in all it was a great day, thanks to those who spent their day helping add to the data base.

Special thanks to Colleen Powell for coordinating Feeder Watchers and Bill Good for the outstanding chili and Oreos lunch served at Teller's Slack Barn, both for the 27th time. Save the date for next year's CBC - December 19, 2015!

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

Day 2- Mammals





TELLER'S FIRST WALK FOR WILDLIFE

On September 28, 2014, Teller held its first Walk for Wildlife, a 2-mile or 5K Family Fun Walk or Run. Over 40 participants of all ages learned about wildlife, habitat and Teller programs at four informative stops while enjoying the scenery on our main property. Although the Teller Trail, located along the Bitterroot River, is open year-round, the location of the walk is not normally open to public walking. While it was a small fundraiser, the main purpose of this event was to showcase Teller and its primary reason for existing; for the benefit of fish and wildlife. Teller's mission "to inspire, educate and demonstrate conservation in action," was certainly on display. Many of the wildlife habitat enhancement projects completed on the property were seen along the walk route. Participants not only learned about the organization's accomplishments, but hopefully picked up a few tips to use on their own properties. Staff and Teller volunteer, Sherry Ritter, manned the informational stops to provide details and answer questions about what the participants were observing, including a variety of deer exclosures, native plantings, food plots and restored ponds and wetlands. Many participants told us how much they enjoyed this family-friendly educational event and appreciated the wildlife-viewing and recreational opportunities it provided. The first 30 paid registrants also received a free Teller water bottle!



CONSERVATION CORNER: CHEATGRASS REDUCTION



Teller will be experimenting with a cheatgrass hotspot this spring. Cheatgrass is an aggressive noxious weed that thrives in dry soils. You may know it as the uncomfortable seeds that poke in your socks. Stewardship Day volunteers cleared a couple acres near Gird Creek of downed trees and sticks to prepare the project site. After a controlled burn of the cheatgrass, the remainder will be sprayed with Roundup. The burn and weed spraying will reduce the cheatgrass seed bed. Pete Lindbergh, Teller's Lands Manager, will then use a mulcher to break up the surface of the soil, being careful not to disturb the soil too much. He will then use a push-seeder to broadcast a drought-resistant wildland grass seed mix over the prepared area. The hope is that once these new grasses are established, they will out-compete the cheatgrass. Thanks to Teller's former Director of Conservation, Sam Lawry, and Stacy Pease of NRCS for consulting on this project!

NEW RESTROOM UNDER CONSTRUCTION AT TELLER











April brings a symphony of bird song to the Teller Wildlife Refuge every spring, and this year is no exception. The chorus is somewhat louder than usual, however, because the Sandhill crane, pheasant and blackbird calls are accompanied by the rumble of heavy equipment and the ringing of hammers.

Thanks in large part to the generosity of donors (including Rich Patterson of PCI Construction and Randy Sacks of Sacks Concrete), Teller is constructing a brand new restroom facility at the historic Slack Barn site. This 550 square foot, state-of-the-art building will boast both men's and women's restrooms with... drumroll...hot and cold running water!

At press time, the below grade plumbing is complete, the cement slab is poured, the walls are framed and – thanks to a crew of stewardship day volunteers – the roof trusses are in place.
